Sponsoring Empowering Women Conference

GFWC Nevis Women's Club (MN) demonstrated various leadership skills as they sponsored the Empowering Women to Lead conference for rural Minnesota women. They gained 501(c)(3) designation as they raised over \$50,000. Scholarships were offered to Native American women and to high school students. Outcomes include 300 rural women being inspired to envision their future, new collaborative partnerships with foundations, businesses, and communitybased organizations, name recognition for GFWC, and new confidence developed by club members.



Patrick Lencioni, author of many outstanding leadership books, has written *The Five Dysfunctions of a Team* in fable format, making this an easy book to read. The content in the fable describes five dysfunctions that even the best teams struggle to overcome. Lencioni suggests action steps that can be taken to conquer these challenges and improve the work of your team.



An accompanying field guide provides practical tools and exercises to help overcome the hurdles that keep them from being effective.

Your State Award Entry should include the Cover Page, two pages listing the Top Ten Projects in your state, and one page describing activities initiated by your State Leadership Chairman and your state.

Your Top Ten Projects should include projects your clubs are doing to build leadership capacity and strengthen leadership in clubs across the state. If your state offers its own LEADS/Leadership Training, please include this information on your chairman page, along with other activities to promote leadership throughout the state.

You may also submit a Club Creativity Project. This entry should include the Cover Page and a one-page description of the most creative leadership project in your state. You are welcome to add a photo if space allows.

This chairman will send a confirmation receipt when your entry is received. However, this chairman will be out of the country from February 24-March 10. If your entry is received during that time, receipts will be sent beginning
