Please Take Action on GFWC's Legislative Priorities

- <u>Time for Women to have Equal Rights</u> ~ It's time for women to have equal rights under the law! Urge Congress to remove the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) to the U.S. Constitution and reaffirm congressional support for women's equality.
- End Campus Sexual Assault ~ Victims of sexual assault require specialized medical treatment and counseling services. Campus sexual assault survivors suffer high rates of PTSD, depression, and drug or alcohol abuse which can hamper both the ability to succeed in school and future employment. Educational equity for women and girls requires fair, responsive, fully developed campus sexual assault policies, knowledgeable administrators, and ultimately, an end to sexual violence on college campuses.
- Reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act ~ It's time to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act, H.R. 1620, devoting resources to local communities by enhancing and expanding prevention programs and services to survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking.

This legislation that was supported by GFWC and signed into law from January 3, 2019 - January 3, 2021:

- Federal HR 1980 A bill to establish in the Smithsonian Institution a comprehensive women's history museum, and for other purposes.
- Federal HR 1957 Great American Outdoors Act
- Federal HR 133 Consolidated Appropriations Act

Safeguard Against Scams and Fraud

The following contains information on scams and fraud. The information is from the Massachusetts website (Mass.gov) and AARP (aarp.org)

- Ask for identification. A shirt or jacket is not proof of someone's affiliation.
- **Beware** of people going **door-to-door** or **cold-calling you.** Con artists will ask for personal information.
- Use contact information posted on government websites or from other official sources
- **Do not give personal information** to people who claim to be government employees. If you apply for individual assistance, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) will ask for your Social Security or bank account number during registration.
- Don't provide personal information on the phone if you didn't start the call
- If in doubt, do not give out your information. Report anyone claiming to be a government worker to local police.
- FEMA-contracted housing inspectors assess damages, but do not determine cost estimates. They also don't hire or endorse specific contractors to repair damage.
- Some people may pose as insurance specialists who can convince FEMA to increase home damage assistance. Ignore them.
- Public insurance adjusters often come to the scene of a disaster to promote their services. Read this Massachusetts Division of Insurance <u>Consumer Alert – Public</u> <u>Insurance Adjusters</u> for tips on choosing a public insurance adjuster.
- Some scammers may attempt to purchase goods with fake FEMA vouchers. FEMA does not offer vouchers.

Only donate to recognized disaster relief organizations.

In these days of COVID-19 there has been an uptick of scammers. Please be aware!

- 1. Vaccine scams. You can't pay to skip the line, reserve an appointment spot or join a clinical trial. Be wary of inbound calls or texts that ask for your Social Security number, financial details or insurance information to reserve your spot. There also have been reports of scammers impersonating local health departments and vaccine providers. Never share personal, financial or medical information with people you don't know. If your pharmacy sends you a text, don't respond; instead reach out with a phone number you know is legit.
- **2.** Vaccine-for-sale scams. Ignore ads touting vaccine for sale from an online pharmacy or elsewhere. It is not.
- **3. Contact tracing scams.** Genuine contact tracers will not ask for money or your Social Security number, bank account or credit card number. Nor will you be asked to disclose your immigration status.
- "Real contact tracers will not ask for money. They will not ask for your Social Security number or your bank or credit card numbers. They also won't ask your immigration status."

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- **4. At-home test kit scams.** While the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has authorized at-home diagnostic tests for COVID-19, scammers are posing as Medicare representatives and asking for Social Security numbers in exchange for what they purport is a free test kit. Some promise overnight delivery. Don't believe it. Instead check with your health department to find a legitimate testing site.
- **5.** Government payment scams. Government agencies will not ask you for payments via cash, gift cards, wire transfers or cryptocurrency.
- **6. Air filter scams.** Fraudsters are emailing, texting, calling and sending letters claiming they have air filters that "will remove COVID-19 from the air in your home." The claim is false.
- 7. Charity scams. Any emergency or disaster leads to a spike in fraudulent charities, so do your homework before giving, especially if the request arises on social media.
- **8. Errand scams.** Bad actors will offer to go to the store for you or do another errand, but run off with your money without delivering the goods or performing the task. Instead of paying a stranger, ask for help from a trusted neighbor or friend.
- **9. Package scams.** Last fall leading up to the holidays, there was a rise in text messages with links that led to websites impersonating legitimate delivery companies. Victims were asked for money or personal information for the delivery of bogus packages or goods they never ordered.
- 10. Peer-to-peer (P2P) mobile payment scams. Exercise caution if you are asked for a fast digital payment. The Venmo app, for example, points out that it is intended for use

Information on the Duties of the Officers is contained in Article V—Officers, Executive Committee (EC) and Their Duties.

Information on Eligibility and the Endorsement is contained in **Article XI—Nominations and Elections** (Pertinent excerpts listed below:)

Section 2. Responsibilities of Nominating Committee

A. The Nominating Committee shall review endorsed candidates for the office of First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer to make sure they meet the criteria specified below:

- 1. To be eligible to serve as an Officer, a prospective nominee shall be a member of an active GFWC Massachusetts Club. She shall have served as President of such a club for at least one year and/or as a member of the Board of Directors of GFWC Massachusetts for at least two years.
- 2. Each candidate must be endorsed for a specific office by a majority vote of her club, properly documented.
- 3. This endorsement accompanied by qualifications and resume, must be submitted before October 1 of the odd calendar year to the Nominating Committee Chairman.

Many of you have participated in leadership roles in your club and on the GFWC Massachusetts Board of Directors and should be willing to step up and participate in the future of our beloved GFWC Massachusetts. I can assure you will have the support and dedication of many GFWC Massachusetts members and it will be a very rewarding and fulfilling experience to be part of the leadership of GFWC Massachusetts. Please let this Nominating Committee Chairman know if you have any questions, need more information, or if I can help in any way. I look forward to hearing many of you from you!

Memorial Forest Management Plan

from President Shibley

Our Federation had a **Forest Management Plan** written in 2010 which was set to expire in 2020. Gary Gouldrup, a New England Forestry consultant was hired by GFWC Massachusetts to develop a 10-year Forest Stewardship and Bird Habitat Assessment Plan after GFWC MA applied for and received financial assistance from the Department of Conservation and Recreation. The plan was approved in 2021 with thoughts going forward for continued forest management, inhabitant respect, and tree harvesting on our property. We will work with the Sudbury Valley Trustees, the Department of Conservation and Recreation and the gas company in the future.

Due to storm damage to or property in the spring and fall of 2020 it was evident that many trees surrounding the caretaker's cottage were deceased and a threat to the inhabitants. In order to remove the trees, approval and paperwork needed to be completed to satisfy the Department of Environmental Protection, Sudbury Conservation Commission, and the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program of the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife departments. The State President took on this monumental task. The official approval was given in March 2021 for the much-needed work to begin. Many hours were spent on this project, with rules and regulations respected and followed. Prices for tree removal are being collected and will be reviewed in 2021.

The teachers were so excited to have new interaction with the students, as zoom learning was taking a toll on spirits of the children.

The chairman worked with the school representative and choose the book <u>One Fish</u>, <u>Two Fish</u>, <u>Red Fish</u>, <u>Blue Fish</u> by Dr. Suess. A google slide presentation was created so the students could follow along on screen and a scavenger hunt activity was planned after the story was read. The scavenger hunt was easy enough for all students to enjoy. They were given a short amount of time to go and find items by color. The WJWC member would ask for 2 colors at a time, students would go and pick something from around their house and bring it back, each student would show their choices. By doing the 2 items at a time, the WJWC member just watched the time and could stop when they were approaching the 30-minute deadline. WJWC reached out to Links-to-Libraries, a local nonprofit who encourages reading as a lifelong skill, to get a book donated for each child that day. Also reaching out to the Dr. Suess Museum a club member was able to get plain white bookmarks and paper hats that the teachers could use as a classroom craft activity.

When story time was over, it was undecided who enjoyed this more, the students or the readers!
