Vaccines for diseases such as polio cost as little as \$1.00 per dose, making it an extremely cost-effective way to make an impact on the life of a child.

For more than six decades, GFWC has supported UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund, in its efforts to ensure the world's most vulnerable children have access to health, immunization, clean water, nutrition, education, emergency and disaster relief, and more. Today, 10 million (25%) of victims of modern slavery are children. The newest partnership with UNICEF USA focuses on the End Trafficking project. This initiative raises awareness about child trafficking while mobilizing communities to take meaningful action to help protect children domestically and internationally. Training and education programs are provided to students, at-risk youth, faith based partners, community groups, and teachers. "Shout Out" Trafficking Events are held at colleges and universities to bring awareness of human trafficking and the effort to end it.
